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

FROM YOUR BOARD PRESIDENT

There was no regular board meeting in May. This was because the "Annual Meeting" is supposed to be held at 7:00 p.m. on the second Tuesday after the first Monday of March each year at the principal office of the Corporation. This inadvertently was missed and was rescheduled to the second Tuesday after the first Monday in May. Letters were mailed to all shareholders well in advance of the meeting informing them of the rescheduled date, and the meeting notice was posted at the clubhouse as required.

The requirements for a quorum for the annual meeting are that 60 properties must be represented for there to be an official meeting. Note that requirement is properties — not individuals. A husband and wife that own their property jointly is one property. I am saddened to report that far fewer than 60 properties were represented at the rescheduled meeting for May. Since I've been a resident of Casa Loma there has not been a single "Annual Meeting" where the required number of properties were represented.

It's discouraging to the Board of Directors that so few people have interest in the community that they live in. In recent years the Board has mailed out ballots to all the owners in an attempt to update the antiquated requirements of our governing documents. In order to make a change to those documents the "quorum" required is 2/3rds of the owners must vote affirmatively. That means we must have approximately 140 "yes" votes. When those ballots were returned there were only 84 properties represented. Since there were not 140, contrary to popular belief, those ballots were not opened. We have no idea how may "yes" votes or "no" voter were in those 84 returned ballots.

This is YOUR community. This is where YOUR property is located. This is where YOU have chosen to invest YOUR money. Why don't you care? Why don't you participate? Have you considered the long-term effect of your lack of concern? The future of Casa Loma is in YOUR hands!

THE HISTORY OF FLAG DAY



In the United States, Flag Day is celebrated on June 14. It commemorates the adoption of the flag of the United States on June 14, 1777, by resolution of the Second Continental Congress. The Flag Resolution, passed on June 14, 1777, stated: "Resolved, That the flag of the thirteen United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation."

The United States Army also celebrates the U.S. Army birthday on this date; Congress adopted "the American continental army" after reaching a consensus position in the Committee of the Whole on June 14, 1775.

In 1916, President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation that officially established June 14 as Flag Day. On August 3, 1949, National Flag Day was established by an Act of Congress. Flag Day is not an official federal holiday. It is at the president's discretion to officially proclaim the observance. On June 14, 1937, Pennsylvania became the first U.S. state to celebrate Flag Day as a state holiday, beginning in the town of Rennerdale. New York Consolidated Laws designate the second Sunday in June as Flag Day, a state holiday.

Perhaps the oldest continuing Flag Day parade is in Fairfield, Washington. Beginning in 1909 or 1910, Fairfield has held a parade every year since, with the possible exception of 1918 and 2020, and celebrated the "Centennial" parade in 2010, along with some other commemorative events. Appleton, Wisconsin, claims to be the oldest National Flag Day parade in the nation, held annually since 1950.

Quincy, Massachusetts, has had an annual Flag Day parade since 1952 and claims it "is the longest-running parade of its kind" in the U.S. The largest Flag Day parade had been held annually in Troy, New York until 2017, which based its parade on the Quincy parade and typically draws 50,000 spectators. In addition, the Three Oaks, Michigan, Flag Day Parade is held annually on the weekend of Flag Day and is a three-day event and they claim to have the largest flag day parade in the nation as well as the oldest.

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

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

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
